Spelling Bee Word Lists

Grades 2-3

The list provided is a good place to start. Please be aware that this list will help you begin preparation. The test will consist of words not included in the lists provided. This is not a test of memorization, but of the skill these students are already strong in.

1. rehearsal- ri HUR suhl

A practice session preparatory to a public performance

This is the final rehearsal before tomorrow's performance.

2. persistent- pur SIS tuhnt

Continuing, existing, or acting for longer than usual

This has been a <u>persistent</u> cold spell.

3. hammer- HAM uhr

A tool used for pounding nails

Please bring a hammer to the work party tomorrow.

4. dynamite- DEYE nuh mite

An explosive

They had to <u>dynamite</u> the building in order to knock it down.

5. litter- 'li-ter

Scattered rubbish: disorder or untidiness

The <u>litter</u> of paper on the sidewalk was deplorable.

6. narrate- nar-rate

To tell in writing or speech

The teacher began to narrate the story.

7. cashier- ka-shir

An officer in a bank or company responsible for receipts and disbursements

The <u>cashier</u> collected the money for the items she bought.

8. raspberry- RAZ ber ee

Small round fleshy red or black berry

These <u>raspberry</u> preserves won blue ribbon at the country fair.

9. traffic- TRAF ik

The movement or number of automobiles along a street

There is a lot of <u>traffic</u> on the freeway now.

10. excuse- eks- kus

An explanation; that which is offered as a reason

What is your <u>excuse</u> for being late?

11.prying- prl-ing

Improperly curious or inquisitive

Someone was prying into her personal affairs.

12. facsimile- fak SIM uh lee

An exact copy; especially one transmitted electronically

I am sending you a <u>facsimile</u> of this report.

13. familiar- fa-'mil-yur

Well acquainted

I am very familiar with the rigors of studying for a spelling competition.

14. pattern- PAT uhrn

A regular, mainly unvarying way of acting or doing

I always follow the same <u>pattern</u> when getting ready for school.

15. orchid- OR kid

The flower of a tropical plant with three petals, the lowest of which is enlarged

When we stepped off the plane in Hawaii, we were each given a <u>orchid</u> lei.

16. refuge- re fyuj

A place of safety; shelter; safe retreat

The deer sought <u>refuge</u> from the hunters.

17. impress- im- 'pres

To leave pressure on something as to leave a mark

We will impress the leaf on paper to make a design.

18. giraffe- juh RAF

Large cud-chewing animal with a very long neck and legs

During our trip to the zoo we enjoyed watching he giraffe chew on the acacia leave.

19. inspire- in SPY- er OR in- SPYRE

To have an animating effect upon; influence or impel

The concert did inspire him to be a musician.

20. fiction- FIK shun

Anything made up or imagined, as a statement, story, etc.

The librarian directed us to the fiction section.

21. scary- SKAIR ee

Causing alarm, frightening

I did not like that scary movie.

22. Hawaii- huh WEYE ee

The island state in the Pacific

The climate of <u>Hawaii</u> attracts many visitors.

23. glossy- gla sE

Having a smooth, shiny appearance or finish

She selected the glossy rock from the pile.

24. vehicle- VEE-uh-kul

Something used to transport persons or goods

We will need a vehicle that holds six people.

25. career- kuh RIR

One's progress through life or in a particular vocation

I enjoy this as a hobby, but I would not want to make a <u>career</u> out of it.

26. sandal- SAN duhl

A shoe consisting of a sole strapped to the foot

I had to take my <u>sandal</u> to the shoe repair shop to have the strap fixed.

27. ruin-ROO in

destroy

Be careful that you do not <u>ruin</u> your good shoes by wearing them in the rain.

28. ransom- RAN suhm

Something paid or demanded for the freedom of a captured person

The kidnapper demanded \$500,000 in ransom for their child.

29. insurance- in SHUR uhn(t)s

A system of financial protection

I will have to pay for my own auto insurance after I get my driver's license

30. software- SAWFT wair

programs for directing the operation of a computer

This new software helps you trace your family tree.

31. sentence- SENT n(t)s

A decision or judgment, as of a court; esp. the determination by a court of the punishment

The sentence was in the defendant's favor.

32. people- PEE puhl

human beings

A large group of <u>people</u> gathered to watch the special event.

33. destroy- di STORY

to tear down

The demolition crew will destroy the whole building.

34. overwhelming- oh vuhr HWEL ming

crushed by reason of force, weight, or numbers

The prosecution presented overwhelming evidence against the accused.

35. neglect- nih- GLEKT

to give little attention or respect to

We must not neglect our homework.

36. carousel- kar uh SEL

a merry go round

I love riding the carousel at the park.

37. prescribe- pri SKRIBE

to order or direct the use of something as a remedy

The doctor will probably <u>prescribe</u> a painkiller for your recurring headaches.

38. active- AK tiv

lively, busy, agile

My dog was very active when it was a puppy.

39. harbor- har- ber

a place of refuge, safety, retreat; a protected inlet, branch of the sea, etc., used as a shelter and anchorage for ships

Many ships were docked at the harbor.

40. remote- ri- 'mOt

distant in connection

There is only a remote possibility of rain today.

41. office- AW fis

a place of business

I usually shop here for office supplies.

42. recruit- rih- KROOT

to secure the services of

Did they <u>recruit</u> you for the competitive team?

43. massive- MAS- iv

large or imposing or impressive; of considerable magnitude

The new bank was massive.

44. shield- SHEELD

something that protects or defends

The guide recommended that we all wear hats to shield ourselves from the sun.

45. retrieve- ri TREEV

to get back; regain

I hope I can retrieve the lost data.

46. recess- REE ses

to halt temporarily

The court will recess until this afternoon.

47. argue- AR gyooh

to dispute or quarrel

My friend and I often argue over trivial details.

48. unruly- un-rool-i

not submissive to rule or restraint

The natives are <u>unruly</u> tonight.

49. faucet- FAW-sit or FAH-sit

a fixture for drawing a liquid from a pipe

A dripping <u>faucet</u> wastes a lot of water.

50. submit-suhb MIT

to refer to others for decisions

We will submit our plan to the committee.

51. ninth- NIN(t)th

the ordinal number 9th

In many school districts, <u>ninth</u> grade is the first year of high school.

52. perfect- PUR fikt

complete in all respects; flawless

The blazing sunset made for a <u>perfect</u> ending to the day.

53. panic- PAN ik

sudden, unreasonable fear

They did not panic when the fire broke out

54. crisis- KREYE sis

decisive or actual time or stage of an event

We knew we had to deal with the <u>crisis</u> quickly and efficiently.

55. fasten- FAS uhn

to become fixed or joined

Let me help you <u>fasten</u> those buckles.

56. first- FURST

preceding all other

I hope I win <u>first</u> place in the spelling competition.

57. signal- SIG nal

a sign or event fixed or understood as the occasion for prearranged combined action.

Traffic was backed up because the <u>signal</u> was broken.

58. mindful- MIND ful

Having in mind; aware heedful, or careful

The children were mindful of the danger of playing in the street.

59. doctor- DOK tur

a person licensed to practice any of the healing arts

The <u>doctor</u> examined the patient.

60. equal- EE kwahl

of the same quantity or size

These two objects have equal value.

61. lecture- LEK (t)chur

an informative talk given for the purpose of teaching.

Today's history <u>lecture</u> was very interesting.

62. caption- KAP shun

a heading or title, as of a newspaper article

The <u>caption</u> at the top of the story attracted my attention.

63. foreign- FOR in

connected with another country

Their formal style of dress was very foreign to us.

64. safety- SAFE tee

freedom from danger; security

Today's presentation was on the <u>safety</u> issues we should employ in case of a disaster.

65. occur- uh KUR

to take place; happen

The celebration will <u>occur</u> next week.

66. wharf- HWORF

A structure built on the shore to enable ships to receive and discharge cargo and passengers

That restaurant on the wharf serves delicious seafood entrees

67. chief- CHEEF

a ruler, leader, head

The crew <u>chief</u> will give you your assignment.

68. retain- ri TANE (not ree tain)

to stay constant

I hope this T-shirt will retain its color after washing.

69. ambush- am-bush

an arrangement of persons in hiding to make a surprise attack

The sheriff did not suspect an ambush.

70. leisure- LEE-zher

freedom from work or duties

Many retirees find it difficult having so much <u>leisure</u> time.

71. harvest- har-vest

time of year when matured fruit, grain, vegetables, etc., are reaped; season's yield; gathering of a crop

We usually harvest our pumpkins and squash for Halloween.

72. grammar- GRAM uhr

the use of language according to proper rules

Your essay will be graded on content, grammar, punctuation and spelling.

73. scissors- SIZ urz

a cutting implement with handles and a pair of blades

Using sewing scissors for cutting paper makes them dull.

74. wrist-rist

the joint of the arm on which the hand turns

Fred sprained his wrist and could not play in the game.

75. enough- i- NUF

sufficient

Do you have enough clothes for your trip?

76. pigeon- PIJ uhn

any of numerous birds with a stout body and smooth plumage.

The fattest <u>pigeon</u> in the park grabbed the most food.

77. woman- WUM- en

a female human being; adult female; femininity

The term 'lady' was once restricted to a woman of the higher social class.

78. plaid- PLAD

a pattern of unevenly spaced repeated stripes crossing at right angles

That is a very nice looking plaid skirt.

79. depth- DEPTH

distance from the top

The pool goes down to a <u>depth</u> of ten feet.

80. puppet- PUP it

doll or figure used in plays

The children will put on a <u>puppet</u> show.

81. surround- suh ROUND

To enclose on all sided; encircle

When playing the game, the children would first <u>surround</u> themselves with all the toy cars.

82. ignore- ig NOR

to disregard deliberately

The students appeared to <u>ignore</u> the teacher's request for silence.

83. whistle- HWIS uhl

a device or manner by which a shrill sound is produced

The sound of a steam train whistle is music to a railroad buff's ears.

84. lonely- LOHN lee

alone; solitary

I was very lonely when I first moved to town.

85. journal- JUR nuhl

a brief account of daily events

We kept a journal of our trips.

86. weird- WIRD or WEERD

strange or bizarre

That is a weird color scheme.

87. powder- POW duhr

any dry substance in the form of very fine, dust like particles

The volcanic ash covered the car with a very fine <u>powder</u>.

88. English- (i)ng-glish OR i(ng)-lish

the language of the people of England, the official language of the British Commonwealth, the U.S., Liberia, etc.

We study **English** in school.

89. yellow- YEL oh

one of the three primary colors

If you combine blue and <u>yellow</u>, you will get green.

90. believe- be-lev'

to have faith or confidence

I <u>believe</u> this will be an interesting contest.

91. label- LAY buhl

identifying card or paper

We could no longer read the <u>label</u> on the jar.

92. fashion- fa-shun

to make it in a certain way; give a certain form to; shape; mold

The potter will fashion the clay to resemble a lion.

93. wisdom- WIZ dem

learning knowledge; good judgment; wise discourse or reaching

We cut or wisdom teeth at about age 15.

94. depress- de-PRESS

to press down; push or pull down; lower

If you depress this button, water comes out.

95. instant-in-stant

a moment of time

The lightning flashed and in the next instant there was thunder.

96. kayak- KI-'ak

an Eskimo canoe, or one similar

The ocean was to rough to take the <u>kayak</u> out today.

97. recommend- REK uh mend

to suggest favorably

I <u>recommend</u> this book to you.

98. wonderful- wun-der-ful

inspiring wonder; amazing

It was a wonderful sight to see the sun set behind the mountain.

99. stomach- STUHM uhk

pouch where food is digested after swallowing

My stomach always aches when I run after eating.

100. salmon- SAM uhn

any of various large fish that live in oceans and swim up streams to lay eggs

The fish ladder at the dam allows the <u>salmon</u> to reach their spawning grounds.
